I attended a few regional and state conferences this term but not as many as I hoped. I led the USA delegation to the biennial IVV Conference of Delegates in Canberra Australia last year.

During this term I advanced from delegate to Vice President-USA on the Governing Council of IVV Americas and Oceania continental association. We established rules for hosting continental events to be held on even years. The first ever Oceaniapiad is next March in Canberra Australia. This is similar to Olympiad held on odd years but only 3 days. AVA clubs have the opportunity to submit a proposal for the first ever Americaspiad in 2028. This would be a great opportunity to highlight one of our regions, possibly built around a regional conference.

Other major events I attended and, in some cases, emceed were the Texas Trail Roundup in San Antonio (2), US Freedom Walks Festival in Arlington Va, Rotorua New Zealand IML and Aussie Peace Walk Canberra Australia.

AVA Secretary – Leslie Stone

It has been my pleasure to serve as your Secretary of AVA: America's walking club since June 2023.

During this time, I have attended all meetings of the Board of Directors. I have prepared the minutes of the meetings and participated in activities of the AVA, including fundraising.

In March 2024, it was my pleasure to attend the IVV Congress, held in Canberra, Australia, as a representative of AVA: America's Walking Club. During this trip, which was made with 5 fellow walkers from the USA, including Vice-Chair Carl Cordes. We attended the walking festival in Rotorua, New Zealand and the Aussie Peace Walk held in Canberra, Australia. It was a great feeling to be able to meet representatives of other countries who, also, have a passion for getting out and walking.

I healed quickly and attended the Canadian Walking Festival in Kingston, Ontario, Canada in May 2024. There, I met more Canadian friends and renewed acquaintances with others.

The Big Give once again was the AVA's largest fundraiser, bringing in greater than \$95,000 in 2024. During my time as Finance Chair, I repeated at almost every board meeting that we do a good job in keeping down our expenses, but our focus needs to be on bringing in revenue, which includes new sources of funds. We spent a good part of 2024 researching the Walking App. There has been an incredible amount of effort put in by that committee and the National Office and we look forward to seeing the fruits of their labor as we anticipate a 2026 launch. Dear Friends,

Since our last Biennial Convention, many of us have lived through challenging times. We have lost Board Members, Club Officers, AVA Members, Friends, and Family. Everyone walks for free these days. Participation will grow the organization, not walk fees.
- 3. Be *intentional* about inviting everyone in our communities to all our walks and events. This means going into communities we are unfamiliar with and inviting them not only to participate but also participate in *their* events and invite them to be a part of the club leadership.

These things are not difficult to do.

Special thanks to all AVA Operational Committees who have been incredibly involved the past several years. Our work could not have been accomplished without their help and the support of the National Office Team and our office Volunteers. I thank you all and appreciate all your help. I am also grateful for the work and support of our Board Chair, Nancy Wittenberg. She has been an inspiration and beacon of hope.

Activities & Accomplishments

The North Central region is made up of the states of North Dakota, South Dakota, Nebraska, Iowa, Minnesota and Wisconsin. There are currently 11 clubs in the region. During the past 4 years, we've lost one club, Central Minnesota Volkssport and added one club, Northwest Nebraska Trails Association. Our clubs have hosted numerous traditional and year around events. Participation is rebounding since the pandemic.

In 2023, Iowa's Walking Club hosted a regional meeting weekend attended by over 75 people.

The clubs in the region continue to come up with innovative ideas for walks and activities, that encourage fun, fitness and friendship. Several walking weekends are planned for 2025 throughout the region, with social activities as well as walking. The clubs are working to develop partnerships with local groups to develop interesting walks, promote walking and hopefully, increase membership. Several clubs have been able to secure sponsorships to increase their walkership and strengthen their club.

The region continues to have leadership and was able to elect a new regional director and deputy regional director.

Concerns & Recommendations

The clubs in the North Central Region face the problems that all our clubs face, declining membership, declining walkers and aging membership. Most of our clubs are fairly strong and work to recruit new members and develop interesting walking opportunities. However, there are struggles to secure club leadership, as past leaders wear out.

One bit of sunshine, it seems interest in walking is increasing, as in the last two months, there have been three groups, one in Iowa and two in Wisconsin, inquiring about starting a volkswalk club.

Northeast Region - Carol C. Giesecke, Board Member

The Northeast Region consists of 10 clubs: 5 in New York State, 2 in Massachusetts and 1 in Connecticut, 1 in Southern Maine and Twin State in Vermont covers walks in Vermont and New Hampshire. The walks in Rhode Island are being covered by the clubs in Connecticut and Massachusetts

The Empire State Capital Volkssporters club is by far the largest club in the region with Walk 'N Mass being the second largest club.

Most clubs struggle with small membership numbers, small participation on walks and even smaller numbers of members who perform the duties of the club. Like many clubs in AVA, members in the Northeast Clubs are aging and some find it difficult to replace volunteers who move away from the region or who can no longer walk long distances.

However, a very bright note throughout the years has been the decision of individual clubs to hold weekend events to which other clubs are invited. For example, one club – the Niagara Frontier Volkssport Club invited clubs from the region and beyond to a weekend event focused on walks in and around Niagara Falls in September 2022. Next, the Walk 'N Mass Volkssport Club planned a weekend event in Hyannis and Cape Cod in May 2023 and also invited clubs from the region and beyond. Walk 'N Mass club's Walk Coordinator Beate Hait kept very careful event records of expenses and supplies needed. These records provided a good starting point for the next group to plan a regional event. This time, the Connecticut Club - CVVC and the Volkssport Club at West Point worked tirelessly together to plan and carry out the Hud to Hou walks in Poughkeepsie and Kent, Connecticut, in September 2004. They relied heavily on the size and expertise of ESCV to provide volunteers to help staff with the events. Chris Yost, then President of ESCV was instrumental in organizing the volunteer shifts, based on what the planners indicated they needed. Therefore, though the numbers in many of our clubs are small, we can do amazing things by working together. Finally, in 2025, three clubs – Two Town Volkssport Club in Danvers, MA, Twin State Volkssport Association in Vermont and Southern Maine Volkssport Association are planning a Tri-State weekend in May 2025.

Another way of helping clubs feel part of a larger group has been the *NERD News*. This idea was introduced to me by Wayne Knapp, former Regional Director. These newsletters, sent to the club presidents, have been a way to provide AVA Board news and regional items that may be of interest. An edition of the *NERD News* was sent out in September 2023, and in May, August and September 2024. Another edition is planned for May 2025. In addition, we have used Zoom to great affect planning the regional meetings and hope to use it more often in the future to provide an opportunity for club members to speak directly to each other about surmounting similar obstacles to growth and retention. We are also keeping the Northeast Website updated and I sincerely appreciate Deputy Regional Director Eileen Skinner's expertise with this part of keeping club members and others informed.

Northwest Region - Sharon Moats, Board Member

ACCOMPLISHMENTS:

In the NW Region, over the past 2 years, Walkers have enjoyed many walks and multi-day events. We have closed 2 clubs, but the members all belonged to other clubs and YR walks were transferred.

We have had some new Volkssporters welcomed into clubs. Many have taken on leadership responsibilities. We have 2 new Trailmasters and several other starting to work on these skills.

This year (2025) our region has 438 SYR/YR down 49 from last year, mainly due to homelessness along routes and major construction. 22 walks are entirely new this year. Last year we had 133 Traditional events and are on the pathway to that number this year, albeit many have become TGW's due to much lower attendance.

Our region is participating in the pilot program using Stickers instead of stamps. Most clubs are participating. A large quantity of sticker pages was procured by donation and shared to clubs. Most clubs have a few people that have the capability to do the printing of the stickers for the club and helping other clubs. The stickers are really appreciated by the walkers.

ACTIVITIES:

- Normal RD duties such as event sanctions, award certificates, participating in local club activities, assisting with technical questions and issues, liaison among local clubs, regions and AVA National.
- Promoted AVA Regional and National events.

CONCERNS:

19% reduction in walkers (mostly physical decline and not driving as far to walk due to traffic) Declining club membership.

Some clubs not having the skills/capacity to refresh walking routes.

So many other walking/hiking opportunities in our region.

RECOMMENDATIONS:

AVA Headquarters, Board and Club Officers review the survey taken this past year and focus on helping our clubs and walkers to have a better level of satisfaction with our product.

Pacific Region – Becky Forsythe, Board Member

Enthusiasm for walking is the driving force of the seasoned walkers of the Pacific Region. The sixteen clubs and one state organization in the region sponsor over two hundred year-round and seasonal walking events providing a wide variety of walks throughout the four states. So far this year nearly seven thousand AVA walks have been taken in this region.

When club members are not out scouting new walk routes and checking currently sanctioned events, they are busy organizing club walks and friendship walks with neighboring clubs. Some clubs hold advertised group walks several times per week. The love of walking is evident by these committed club leaders.

In June 2024, the California State Organization held its annual convention in Rohnert Park, CA. It was hosted by the Sonoma County Stompers and Vaca Valley Volks. The event was a grand success, and the organizers were greatly appreciated for their hard work which showed off the beautiful wine country and the San Jose area.

There is an opportunity to walk in every county seat in Nevada. This is an amazing and unique set of walks. Many walks are quite remote. This is definitely something for a county adventurer to explore.

It is a pleasure to work with so many hardworking, committed people that love what The American Volkssport Association has to offer to everyone. Without their enduring efforts, the message and example of fun, fitness and friendship through walking together would no longer shine in this Pacific Region.

Although there are several very vibrant and active clubs in the Pacific Region, the biggest challenges to this region are the decreasing number of event walkers and the need for fresh leadership both in the clubs and regionally.

Rocky Mountain Region – Steve Sandridge, Board Member

Our region continues to offer over 100 year-round and traditional events despite continued club membership and walk participation and venue fee challenges. Our selection of year-round/seasonal and traditional events offer plenty of great scenery throughout the Rockies! Here are a few highlights:

- The Woodland Wanderers club hosts the new Grain Elevators: Monarchs of the Plains special program and continues to host its Utah County Seat Challenge of year-round walks in all 29 county seats through 2026. See https://woodlandwanderers.org/ for details and special completion award.

- Our Wyoming Buffalo Pathfinders club has year-round events in scenic Lander and the famous Thermopolis Hot Springs State Park along with several other events taking in lots of western heritage. The Rocky Mountain Wanderers' year-rounds include some great walks in the famous mountain towns of Vail, Frisco and Georgetown.

- This year the Colorado Springs Walking Club hosts a new seasonal walk at the very scenic Sandstone Ranch Open Space and continues to host the final year of the Rails to Trails special program.

- Our Falcon Wanderers club in Colorado Springs continues their periodic fellowship walks while annually hosting over 30 traditional, seasonal and year-round events. They're also developing a 2026 Special Program commemorating America's 250th anniversary and AVA's 50th Anniversary.

- A special thanks to Walking Adventures International who annually sponsor interesting walks at various western National and State Parks.

As I end my second consecutive RD tour, our recently elected former DRD, Christopher Begnoche, of Saint George, Utah, assumes RD duties in May. An AVA Life Member, Chris began AVA walks several years ago with the First State Webfooters Walking Club in Delaware. Here he organized the Saint George, Utah, Virgin River Walk and also hosts the Bryce and Zion National Park walks. At the national level, Chris served on the AVA Awards Committee. Congratulations, Chris!

Be sure to make some Rocky Mountain region walks part of your Rockies travels!

South Central Region – Teresa Arnold, Board Member

The South Central Region consists of five (5) states with ten (10) active clubs currently. Our clubs are no nearer than a minimum of two hours apart, however, despite this distance, our clubs support each other and attend the events of fellow clubs and often host multi-events together.

In 2024, 38 traditional events were held with a total participation of 1,279; in addition, there were 130 YREs with a total participation of 4,189.

Many of the traditional events were multi-events, which tend to increase participation. Walkers like the opportunity to get more "bang for their buck" Also, many clubs are including walk events in all the counties of their respective state to attract the "county-walkers"

South Central had a very successful Regional Roundup in October, of 2024, with an average of 60 participants with attendees from fourteen (14) states!

The South Central clubs continue to strive to increase visibility in order to attract new walkers to our sport, so that more will enjoy the benefits of Fun, Fitness, and Friendship.

Southeast Region – Kathryn King, Board Member

This biennial, the Southeast Region added one club--the Alpine Helen Volksmarch Club in Helen, Georgia. The club has revitalized the annual Volkswanderung 5 and 10K in April featuring a Bavarian Biergarten Style Festival and a huge prize drawing.

The Mid-Florida Milers, Happy Wanderers, and Suncoast Sandpipers continue to host their successful Walk Around Florida. The 2025 event, scheduled for November 7-9, will be the 34th. Four walks and a swim in south Orange and north Osceola counties in central Florida are scheduled. Fall is a great time to visit Florida.

With more than 200 sanctioned events in the region, there are trails for everyone to explore in the Southeast.

Southwest Region – Andy Thomas, Board Member

TTR: The Texas Trail Roundup was well-organized and successful this year. Many participants want to see it return next year. Since this event had been established and organized for several years by Susan Medlin, and she was diagnosed with ALS, this year's event was a tribute to her, and the leaders were planning to retire the event. Susan Medlin, in hospice care in Oregon, passed away shortly before the closing ceremony.

After getting so much positive feedback, the organizers are planning to continue the TTR in future years, with the AVA National Office in charge of it. The AVA can use certain resources such as contacts with the city, registration software, volunteer signup system, wider call for volunteers, etc.

AVA 50th: Club leaders are working on possible plans for regional and/or national celebrations of the AVA's 50th anniversary, possibly in San Antonio or Fredericksburg. Watch for updates in the TAW and Checkpoint.

Texas Volkssport Association: The TVA holds semiannual meetings with 2 to 3 walks during a weekend. On Nov. 7 to 9, 2025, the next meeting will be in Gonzales featuring a 3-month seasonal walk marking the 200th anniversary of the city. Gonzales is best known for the "Come and Take It" cannon from the 1836 Texas Revolution. This weekend will also have walks in Shiner and Palmetto State Park.

In March 2026, the North Texas clubs will host the TVA meeting. Plans are tentative, but they mentioned possibly Granbury and Dinosaur Valley State Park.

New Mexico Counties: New Mexico has many YREs and seasonal walks available for any walkers on an extended journey following the convention. This includes six county walks that are concluding Helen Hull's county program.

ACCOMPLISHMENTS:

B. Proposed bylaw changes in support of the Membership Committee and the BOD: Restate and update bylaws section 3 Membership

C. Policy Manual Addendum: Corporation Dissolution instructions provided to CEO for review

RECOMMENDATION:

The committee recommends the Board review and forward the 2025 proposed bylaws changes (Atch 1) to the membership for approval at the May, 2025, AVA convention regular meeting.

ACTIVITIES:

The Governance Committee met for several months throughout 2024 and early 2025 and reviewed the following topics and issues as requested by the Chair, Board, CEO and committees.

Explanatory notes:

1. Bylaws reviews.

a. The committee spent a few months meeting and reviewing the Membership Committee's recommendation to drop the current Affiliate Membership, offer a national Individual Membership and discontinue future AVA lifetime memberships. The CEO has already sunset Lifetime memberships effective March 31, 2025. The committee offers recommended bylaws changes to create the Individual member category as part of its overall 2025 bylaws change recommendations. See attached summary of recommended bylaws changes (Atch 1).

b. The AVA Nominating Committee requested Bylaws changes to enhance committee flexibility. The committee reviewed and recommended some changes. See attached recommended 2025 proposed bylaws changes (Atch 1).

c. The CEO suggested allowing national staff to handle club deactivation requested

(i.e. remove Board approval). The committee agreed and recommended a related bylaws change flexibility. See attached recommended 2025 proposed bylaws changes Atch 1).

d. The committee also made several recommended administrative bylaws changes (see attached recommended 2025 proposed bylaws changes).

e. The committee reviewed AVA Bylaws in reference to Intellectual Property for using club walk routes, maps and brochures for the new AVA APP underdevelopment. It's not clear whether AVA has any such agreements with clubs for posting walks on the AVA website or OSB system. The CEO advised that corporate counsel recommends AVA have a more detailed property rights agreement with its clubs. The committee consensus is that the bylaws are sufficiently broad as to AVA's right to use club member walk information. Instead of adding what is arguably operational-level detail to the bylaws, the committee suggests that the End User License Agreement (EULA) that will accompany the new APP should outline all AVA, club and member rights and obligations for using the new APP and would be the best document to capture such club walk/map authorizations and rights.

2. **Corporation Dissolution instructions.** The committee identified that the AVA does not have any detailed policy or checklists to handle corporate insolvency should the need arise. Having such a policy is simply one hallmark of a non-profit's due diligence and having an exit plan is merely an indication of sound corporate governance – something every good organization should have. While insolvency is briefly mentioned in the AVA Certificate of Formation (Article 2), the AVA should have more detailed policy steps, checklists or best-practices for the Board and Staff to follow. Accordingly, the committee provided the CEO a detailed outline (not included in this report) of current non-profit exit plan best-practices including several applicable website references for review and feedback.

3. **Remote Voting.** The committee briefly considered the issue of allowing remote voting at conventions. Although the bylaws text seems to conflate board / committee meetings with regular and special (national) member meetings, the committee suggests AVA keep the current proxy voting system for voting at regular or special (national) meetings.

4. Code of Civility. The committee continued to discuss a possible need for an AVA "Code of Civility" or some delineation of behavior standards for its clubs and members. A brief review of several for-profit and non-profit policies indicates that such policies or guideline are difficult to enforce but might contribute

to at least help share expectations of behavior. No action taken by the committee. Perhaps this could be included in a future Affiliate Expectations chartering document under an as-yet-to-be-determined new AVA club construct.

5. Future Governance Improvements. The committee also discussed ideas to improve AVA's overall flexibility in governing the organization. These notions would require further study and, if recommended by the Board, would require members voting to approve. Specifically, there are efficiencies to be had by making some fundamental changes to the current AVA Bylaws governance model to reflect the following:

a. AVA members should elect Board Directors and not specific Board or Corporate officers (Chair, Vice, Finance, Secretary). Instead, members would elect directors and the Board would then select or appoint its officers from among the elected directors. This already happens should an officer need to be replaced in between our semiannual regular member meetings (the Board appoints a new officer from among its directors and can currently replace a vacating director and officer).

b. The Board should have the authority to amend AVA Bylaws whenever necessary. This was actually recommended by corporate counsel in the first draft of the 2021 revised bylaws but was omitted. There could be some process to solicit member inputs but the reality is that members elect directors to run the corporation on their behalf.

Nominations Committee – Robert Buzolich, Chair

For the AVA 2025 Biennial Convention and General Membership Meeting, the Nominations Committee identified one nominee for each of the AVA's National Leadership Positions to be elected during the May 5 Session of the General Membership Meeting. There is no competition for any of the positions, which effectively disallows the exchange of fresh and competing views to guide stakeholders in their voting decision. The process, no doubt, was challenging for the committee due to inertia within the organization.

In general, the lack of interest is the major concern. We need people to volunteer not only to run for national office, but also to serve on committees. The continuing lack of interest does not reflect well for the organization. It does reflect a lack of vitality. The reverse of which is a key element of sustaining and growing the organization.

Communications within the organization seems not to reach all stakeholders. The use of TAW, the Checkpoint, some email addresses and some Board Members/Regional Directors may connect us with the majority of stakeholders. However, we seem to be missing stakeholders, who may actually have an interest in the information disseminated and may be inclined to take action. In other words, we may have missed someone's nomination, because he or she was unaware of what was happening??

With respect to communications, we are also faced with the prospect of having to expand our ability to communicate with many, and hopefully, more active stakeholders. If passed during the General Membership Meeting in Las Cruces, the proposed Bylaw changes regarding individual members will require expanding the number of stakeholders to be represented by the Regional Directors. One of the key functions of the Regional Director is to facilitate communications between the National Organization and all stakeholders within the Region. If the above mentioned Bylaw changes are passed, Regional Directors will need to expand their communication efforts to include the individual members to ensure that all stakeholders are represented.

Please do not interpret this report as doom and gloom for the AVA. However, do take it as a call to action, and to serve in leadership roles at the national, regional and club levels as the opportunities arise.
