

CHECKPOINT VS THE AMERICAN WANDERER (TAW)

America's Walking Club (AVA) has two national publications, the Checkpoint and The American Wanderer (TAW). The Checkpoint is a monthly digital publication that is emailed to AVA Club or Individual members who subscribe to it. This main purpose of the Checkpoint is to keep our members informed on updates or changes in organizational policies, procedures, and national events. The TAW is our quarterly national publication. It is also emailed to all AVA Club and Individual members. AVA Members can request a hard copy of the TAW by contacting marian@ava.org. The main purpose of the TAW is to market national and club events and inform readers about all the exciting walks in each region.

AVA INDIVIDUAL MEMBERSHIP CHANGES (AUGUST 2025 CHECKPOINT)

During the AVA Regular Membership Meeting Club members voted to Amend our bylaws replacing Associate members with Individual members and entitling Individual members with most of the same benefits as Club members including the right to vote. This means every AVA National, Individual Member, eighteen years or older, who is in good standing can now vote on any business brought before the AVA Membership. The one benefit that does not extend to Individual members is the right to conduct or sponsor AVA sanctioned events.

PRESIDENT'S UPDATES



In light of these Bylaws changes, Associate and Family membership categories no longer exist. The only categories that now exist are Regular Club Members, State Association Members, Individual Members and Honorary Members. Honorary members may not conduct, or sponsor AVA sanctioned events or vote at meetings of the members.

The AVA National Individual membership cost is \$25.00 per person and includes the following benefits:

- * A 10% discount on most AVA merchandise;
- A 10% discount on our National Conventions registration full package and other signature events hosted by the National Office;
- 🖈 An annual subscription to The American Wanderer (TAW), a national walk publication of the AVA;
- È Each AVA Individual member is entitled to participate in Membership meetings;
- È Each AVA Individual member (18 yrs or older) is entitled to one vote on each matter submitted to a vote of the members.



Although Family membership was never an official AVA membership category, we will continue to offer AVA Individual members the benefit to enroll up to two family members, under the age of 18 and living in the same household, as a family member for an additional nominal price of \$5.00 per family member.

Family members are not Individual members and must be under the age of eighteen and therefore not entitled to vote. However, they are eligible for all other benefits. Should you have any questions please contact Erin at erin@ava.org

JOURNEY - ANONYMOUS AVA MEMBER

The year 2026 will be a monumental year for several reasons, why not plan walks around some of the events, A few dates to commemorate are:

- AVA will celebrate the 50th Anniversary:
 - AVA was chartered as an associate member by IVV on April 30,1976- First Walk: In Fredericksburg TX June 12 and 13, 1976 as the Texas Walk Fest
 - Forty-seven years ago: The first National Walking Convention was in Dayton OH on June 16, 1979 where the AVA name was adopted
 - Ten years ago, many AVA office members came to the National Office.
- The United States will celebrate its 250th Anniversary
- Rails-to-Trails will celebrate their 40th Anniversary. Many local clubs incorporate trails created under this program in their club walks.

In 2026 the Rails-to-Trails Conservancy (RTC) will celebrate their 40th Anniversary. The RTC has a major initiative underway to establish a trail 3,700 miles long from Washington DC to Washington State. The "Great American Trail". To assist in identifying existing trails, the RTC website provides "TrailLink," an on-line application that provides trail information nationwide.

I understand the AVA Nation wants to celebrate the AVA 50th Anniversary in all ten AVA Regions during 2026. More information will be coming out about the many celebrations. Also, many local clubs plan to designate events as celebrating the AVA Anniversary. The more opportunities to get out and walk the better. Let's plan a great 2026!

24TH ANNUAL IML US FREEDOMWALK FESTIVAL OCTOBER 17-19, 2025

The annual US FreedomWalk returns to Arlington, VA October 17-19, 2025. This event is one of two IML events in the United States. You'll enjoy three days of events, including walking, biking and swimming, with volkssporters from around the world. Register at usfreedomwalk.org.

All walks will start each day at a new location this year, American Legion Post 139, 3445 Washington Blvd in Arington. There is no free parking at the site, but it is close to the Washington Metro-rail system. There are paid parking lots and paid street parking. Check the website in October, to see if there is reduced parking that is currently being negotiated.

The 21km walks on Saturday and Sunday are IML (International Marching League) accredited walks.

Friday Oct 17th, a Welcome Walk will take you west along the Potomac River, walking either a 5K or 10K. Arlington was named one of the five friendly platinum communities in the U.S. There is also a bike and swim event. The opening ceremony starts at 4pm at the Post.

Saturday, choose from the IML walk (21K), or a 12K or 6K, which all take you into Washington D.C. The walks go by embassies, memorials, the National Mall and all three branches of the federal government (depending on which walk you choose). Bike and swim events also available. Plus that evening, there is an International Dinner. Please pre-register by October 5: usfreedomwalk@gmail.com.

Sunday, choose between the 6,12 or 21 km walking to the C&O Canal and other parks. See the complete schedule here.

The designated hotel is the Holiday Inn Arlington at Ballston. The US FreedomWalk is a premier event for volkssporters. To receive IML credit, walkers must walk at least 20k on each of the primary walking days (minimum 2 days in a row). If you are 70 or older, you can do two 10Ks for IML credit. AVA and IVV credit will also be given.

Register at usfreedomwalk.org. Three day walk packages are \$40. There are also two-day packages, or you can register daily at the event. For more information, please email usfreedomwalk@gmail.com.

AMERICA'S WALKING CLUB PLANS 50TH ANNIVERSARY CELEBRATION

It's our 50th birthday! So we are having a walking party every month in 2026 to celebrate.

AVA: America's Walking Club is celebrating its 50th anniversary in 2026, marking five decades of Fun, Fitness and Friendship. Special walking events will take place monthly in each region of the United States, which also coincides with America's 250th celebration.

A planning committee has been working hard with each regional director to sponsor a "featured" anniversary event; and while RDs are still working on details, we wanted to alert you to these events so you can plan your travels. Special awards are being planned with the AVA 50th Anniversary Commemorative Passport, for those who attend all featured events, or a certain number of events. Here's the featured list, as of August 10:

January 9-11 – Boulder City, NV (Pacific Region) – Chairman's Anniversary Celebration

Carl Cordes, Chair of the AVA Board, has planned a three-day kickoff celebration in Boulder City, NV, 25 miles south of Las Vegas, and home of Hoover Dam. Sponsored by the Las Vegas High Rollers and Strollers, there will be a mix of self-guided and group walks, as well as two socials. Walks include the Historic



Railroad Tunnels Trail in the Lake Mead National Recreation Area, Bootleg Canyon, and Veterans Memorial Park. A fajita group dinner will be Friday night. Saturday evening, the city is sponsoring the Best Dam Wine Walk through historic Boulder City, which counts as a 5K (and we get a discounted price of only \$15). February 20-22 – San Antonio, TX (Southwest Region) – Texas Trail Roundup IML



The annual IML Texas Trail Roundup returns in 2026 to San Antonio, TX, one of only two IML events in the United States. Friday will be the 50th Anniversary Walk in Fredericksburg, TX where the first volkswalk took place in 1976. The walk will take you through this beautiful hill-country town of German heritage, with

many shops and restaurants. Buses will take you back and forth for this milestone event. Saturday the IML kicks off in San Antonio with 42K and 21K events, along with 12K and 5K events. Sunday choose walks of 21K, 10K and 5K. Registration opens soon: texastrailroundup.org. Special rate at Springhill Suites Downtown/River Walk.



March 20-23 – Williamsburg, VA (Atlantic Region) – Atlantic Regional Conference



The Peninsula Pathfinders of Virginia are sponsoring the 2026 Atlantic Regional Conference in Williamsburg, VA for 4 days with its rich colonial history and American Revolution significance. This is a great city to celebrate AVA's 50th, and the U. S. 250th. Details are being planned now.

April - North Central Region – Iowa/Nebraska River Walk

May - Northeast Region - May 17-19 Lake George, NY. More info coming.

June 6, 2026 - Crazy Horse, SD (North Central Region) More information to come.

June 19-21, 2026 Mid America Regional Conference - Indiana and Illinois

Enjoy walks in Terre Haute IN, Charleston IL, and Casey IL. Four walks, lunch and social. More info to come.

July – Colorado Springs, CO (Rocky Mountain Region) – Garden of the Gods

The Falcon Wanderers in Colorado Springs will highlight one of the most beautiful areas in the state – Garden of the Gods. It sits beneath Pike's Peak, and within its environment, there are grasslands, stunning red sandstone formations, and mountain forest. It is a Natural National Landmark and free to the public. More details to come.

August - To Be Announced

September 7, 2026 – Mackinaw City, MI (Mid-America Region) – Mackinac Bridge Walk



Because this walk is so popular, we are tentatively adding the event to our anniversary celebration. AVA will help the Mid-America RD with all aspects of the event. This is the only day a year when the Mackinac Bridge is closed to traffic until noon so pedestrians

can walk across and enjoy the views of the Straits of Mackinac. The total walk across the entire bridge and back is 20k but people can choose to walk as far as they want, then turn around. More details to follow.

September 12-13 or 19-20 – Astoria, OR (Northwest Region) – NW Regional Conference

The Oregon Trails State Volkssport Association is planning their Regional Conference for the Northwest in Astoria, OR. Located at the mouth of the Columbia River at the Pacific Ocean, Astoria is Oregon's oldest city, and the first

permanent U.S. settlement west of the Rockies. More information to follow on the walks and socials.

October 16-18 – Arlington, VA (Atlantic Region) – IML FreedomWalk Festival

2026 is the 25th Annual IML FreedomWalk Festival in Arlington, VA and Washington D. C. This will be a great year to enjoy these events through America's history in D. C. and Arlington. Three days of trails from 5K to 22K along with bike, swim, and socials. Save the Date for this special IML event. More details to follow.

Oct 28 – Nov 1 – Route 66 Walks in Kansas, Missouri and Oklahoma (South Central Region)



Route 66, the most famous highway in the U.S., celebrates 100 years in 2026. 

AVA SPECIAL PROGRAMS USA/AVA ANNIVERSARY HURRAH

The USA-AVA Anniversary Hurrah is a new Special Program starting in 2026 – The 250th Anniversary of the USA and the 50th of the AVA. Due to the uniqueness of the anniversary years, this program will only run from January 1, 2026 through December 31, 2026. Redeem completed books by December 31, 2027. This program is designed to emphasize the entire history of both the USA and the AVA, not just the events around 1776 or 1976. Each of us has our sense of the history that we wish to celebrate: It could be the men elected to office, the conflicts we've had, the geography we celebrate, the evolution of transportation, the trails and waterways followed, the arts we preserve, the culture we wish to know better, the schools and the museums which preserve history, the events of the 23 remaining AVA clubs from the original 100, the 181 still sanctioned YRE/Sea events of the original 250, the sites of our first 22 national biennial conventions, or all of the expired special programs which you missed. The sub-program you wish to accomplish within this Special Program is your choice. Space has been provided within the record book for recording an abbreviated code for some potential sub-programs or you may devise your own. Complete twenty-five (25) events to receive an embroidered patch reflecting the national geography highlighted in the Song "America the Beautiful". Every AVA sanctioned event: Traditional, YRE, SEA, or guided walk, is a qualifying event. You may complete 25 different events or you can complete as single event 25 times if your geography is isolated. Each stamp impression must be paid for and completed at a separate time. Since many locations may not have a sanctioned event which goes by a site you wish to see or visit, complete the closest event which is available and visit the true site before or after.

You will find descriptions of all AVA sanctioned events, both traditional and YRE/SEA, at the website ava.org under the Find an Event tab. Revisiting the site is recommended since new events may be sanctioned which celebrate an individual club's version of history.

This Special Program is hosted by Falcon Wanderers Volkssport Association in Colorado Springs. The books will become available on November 1, 2025. There is also a special hotel rate at the SpringHill Suites San Antonio Downtown/Riverwalk Area of \$125 per night. Must book by January 30, 2026.


While routes and socials are being finalized as of TAW deadline, here's the basic schedule for the weekend:



I first learned about AVA when a library patron gave me a brochure for an upcoming Traditional Walk in Sacramento thru the Fab 40's over Valentine's weekend in 1988. I loved that there wasn't a specific time to start the walk. The route was wonderful and all I had to do was follow the chalk arrows and ribbons marking the way. I was hooked and, in those days, California had a plethora of clubs and Traditional Walks almost every weekend to join in. Stamping my books added to the joy of walking, not to mention the heady experience of completing them.

My most memorable walk was at the AVA National Convention 2007 in Sacramento CA. Northern California hosted the Convention and it took people all over northern California to explore and walk. At the end of the Convention, the walk took people across the Golden Gate Bridge and back. At the time I was the CVA (California Volkssport Association) President and was very involved in all the activities. I will never forget walking across that bridge and seeing people I'd met that week from all over the USA. When I'd started volkswalking, I invited friends, brought my son and never thought of joining a club. Fifteen years later, five of us attended a Sticks meeting, joined the club and months later the club voted me their new president. Four years later in 2007 I became the head of CVA and attended my first AVA Convention. I was overwhelmed with how smoothly the AVA organization ran and loved meeting other walkers from all over the USA. Friendships were formed that week and to this day, crossing the Golden Gate Bridge brings back memories of that 2007 Convention.

My favorite walk is still the Sacramento—Fab 40's Year-Round Event. The homes are elegant, stately and grandiose and yet the sidewalks are open to everyone. The walk is shady and perfect to walk in every season. Every Christmas I offer several Christmas Lights Night Walks, and this is one of our favorites because the homes are heavily decorated and you can see so much more walking than driving. Over the years I've also offered a Halloween Night Walk as well—the decorations are outrageously great and it's so fun to walk amidst families with their children.



CELEBRATES NATIONAL VOLKSSPORTING MONTH
WITH AN AUTUMN FEST IN MONTGOMERY COUNTY INDIANA

The Indiana Volkssport Association (INVA) with the assistance of the Mid-America Regional Director will celebrate National Volkssporting Month during the peak of the Autumn Season with a Group Guided Walk at the Shades State Park, which straddles the boundary of Parke and Montgomery Counties in Central Indiana on Saturday, October 25. In conjunction with this Fest Weekend, the Mid-America Regional Director will host a Group Guided Walk in Crawfordsville, which is the county seat of Montgomery County, on Sunday, October 26.



On Saturday, October 25, walkers will experience the challenging trails beneath the colorful crowns of the lush forests of the Shades State Park along the banks of Sugar Creek, as it winds its way down to the Wabash River. Be cautious, though, in the event of autumn mists and drizzles, the trails may be muddy or slick. However, views of the Sugar Creek water shed should be fantastic. Keep your fingers crossed that there are no flash flood threats on this date. Walkers may choose to walk a distance of 5 or 10 kilometers. The route will consist of two 5-kilometer loops over an unimproved existing trail system that will avoid significant inclines to be traversed by steps or ladders. Registration, which is at the Hickory Shelter, opens at 9 am (Eastern time), and closes by 10:15 am with the last Walking Group hitting the trail by 10:15 am. Walking Groups may begin their adventure after a sufficient number of walkers have completed registration to form a group. Please note that this event in an Indiana State Park for which a gate fee applies. The fee is \$7 for Indiana-plated vehicles and \$9 for out-of-state plated vehicles. 
Walkers, from near and far, are invited to the "Heartland of America" for the "Hoofin' It On Halloweed' extended weekend, October 30 – November 2. The Sunflower Sod Stompers of Topeka will be sponsoring this volkssporting weekend as it marks the beginning of the club's 41st year.

Six sanctioned walking events will be located in 4 different counties of south-central Kansas, almost encircling the greater Wichita area. Besides Sedgwick County, the events will be in the Kansas counties of Butler, Cowley, and Sumner. Most of these counties were walked at least 5 years ago - some just at the beginning of the "Walking the Kansas Counties" program. DOGWOOD TRAILBLAZERS FALL EVENTS

Dogwood Trailblazers Walking Club of Joplin, Missouri will be hosting a fall, 2-event day October 25, 2025 in southeast Kansas. The first event will take place in Girard, Kansas in the morning, and then 12miles away in Arma, Kansas for the afternoon event. Both towns are tied to the early coal mining industry prevalent in this area in the late 1800 hundreds.

Both towns were bedroom support communities to larger Pittsburg, Kansas. Although Pittsburg was larger, Girard surfaced as the county seat. These walks are on flat ground. Girard will have a 10 and 5k routes while only a 5k course will be available for Arma. Grain elevators are more than evident in Girard if doing that Special Program. Rest rooms and parking facilities will be handy for both towns. These walks will be worthy of your attention.



SAINT LOUIS WALKERS

The Saint Louis Walkers will sponsor a walk at Bellefontaine Cemetery in St. Louis, MO on Sunday, October 26, 2025. The cemetery is located at 4947 West Florissant Ave in St. Louis, MO. Bellefontaine Cemetery is a nonprofit, non-denominational cemetery and arboretum. Founded in 1849 as a rural cemetery, Bellefontaine has several architecturally significant monuments and mausoleums such as the Louis Sullivan-designed Wainwright Tomb, which is listed on the National Register of Historic Places. The cemetery contains 314 acres of land and over 87,000 graves. The Saint Louis Walkers' 5K and 10K walks give one an overall picture of the cemetery. Well-known graves include those of explorer William Clark, Adolphus Busch (co-founder of the Anheuser-Busch brewery), his wife (Lily Anheuser), US Senator Thomas Hart Benton, educator Susan Blow, author William S. Burroughs, and James McDonnell (founder of the McDonnell Aircraft Corporation). The cemetery has many Union and Confederate soldiers from the American Civil War, as well as local and state politicians. It has the largest collection of private and family mausoleums and sarcophagi in Missouri. Its oldest graves are from 1816, located on pioneer Edward Hempstead's family lot. Many of the wealthiest families at Bellefontaine have ornate mausoleums which overlook the Mississippi River. These mausoleums have Classical, Roman, Gothic, and Egyptian architectural styles. Well-known mausoleums include the Wainwright Tomb, designed for Charlotte Dickson Wainwright by the famed Chicago School architect Louis Sullivan in 1892.

In addition to being a cemetery, Bellefontaine is a Level III Accredited Arboretum. The arboretum's mission is to support and enhance the cemetery as a place of perpetual commemoration, and as a garden of beauty, inspiration, and historic significance. Bellefontaine's grounds are home to a vast array of trees and shrubs of local, regional, and international origins providing a changing landscape every season.

Bellefontaine Cemetery and Arboretum in St. Louis has a new meditation labyrinth designed by Robert Fishbone. It's a circular structure made of granite pavers, featuring a single, winding path leading to the center intended for contemplation and reflection. It will be open by the end of 2025.

5K Outer Loop

This loop has a lot of history and points of interest with some areas without headstones. You will walk past a grove of plants being grown especially for our wonderful St Louis Zoo animals. Then you will walk past the original entrance gate which is missing the welcome center building but has other interesting points. Further along you will see areas that appear to not have any or very few graves but take time to check out the tombstones and you will find that area was used during a depression, so a lot of people did not have money for headstones. These areas are completely full.





5K Inner Loop

This loop has a multitude of interesting headstones and crypts. Some of the columns look like they are broken off, but no, they were designed that way to indicate the person had died while in the middle of a project. It might be while raising her children or he was building a building or designing a park.

There will be no crypts open at the time of the walk. However, the cemetery does have tours available conducted by master guides. Individuals may tour the grounds on their own using maps available at the cemetery office.

We hope you will join us from November 7—9 to celebrate walking at WAF34 in Orlando, Florida! We'll be getting an early start on next year's 50th anniversary of American volkssporting, where our next WAF will be a featured Regional event on the 2026 AVA anniversary calendar.

The pre-registration brochure for this year's weekend is now available. You have until October 7th to register for the group rate (\$117+taxes) at our hotel – the Fairfield Inn & Suites Orlando – Kissimmee/Celebration, and until October 25th to submit your pre-registration. Pre-registration will reserve a place for the dinner (space limited) and sign-up for events and awards – or you can register for individual events when you arrive. Ford's Garage at the Vineland Outlets Center will be our Saturday night dinner venue. A popular chain of American restaurants founded in 2012 in Florida, Ford's Garage features design and décor reminiscent of a 1920's-era service station. Ford's Garage is where "great food meets vintage vibes."

SEASONAL WALKS IN FRISCO, TEXAS - HOME OF THE DALLAS COWBOYS HEADOUARTERS

Dallas Trekkers have a new seasonal event in Frisco, Texas, about 30 miles north of Dallas. From October 1 until December 31, 2025, the 5K/10K walk encompasses two areas of Frisco: The Star, home of the Dallas Cowboys World Headquarters, and the Hall Office Park, with numerous sculptures in its multi-use acreage.

The Star is the 91-acre campus of the Dallas Cowboys headquarters and practice facility. The walk will take you among the many restaurants (about 35), facilities, hotels, and retail space, along with the Cowboys Ring of Honor Walk. The practice arena is a 12,000-seat stadium used by the Cowboys, Frisco school district for Friday night varsity football, along with soccer and lacrosse games.

The walk continues to Hall Park, a business park comprised of 162 acres, combining business, residential, hospitality and cultural offerings. You'll walk through the Texas Sculpture Garden, named one of the best spots for outdoor art in the Metroplex.



The 10k walk will include the Dallas Stars hockey team, and the minor league baseball facilities.

Group walks will take place this fall. If interested, contact the Dallas Trekkers for information.

Register to walk this event through the Online Start Box only on the ava website. However, if you join us for a group walk, we will have the stamps available.

NOTE: Special light shows take place on Friday and Saturday after Thanksgiving and early December at the Star with the Cowboy Cheerleaders, Santa, and more starting at 6PM.

THREE DAYS OF WALKS IN THE HISTORIC GONZALES AREA - "THE LEXINGTON OF TEXAS"

The San Antonio Pathfinders invite you to enjoy three days of walks in one of the most historic areas of Texas – Gonzales, which is celebrating its 200th year. The event is November 7 – 9, 2025.





Friday November 7, the 10k/5k event starts anytime between 1pm to 3pm at the K. Spoetzl Brewery in Shiner, TX, about 18 miles from Gonzales, and finishes by 5pm at the Shiner Brewery Lawn area. Your walk will take you into historic Shiner, TX, founded in 1885 by Henry B. Shiner, who donated the land for the railroad. Czech and German immigrants soon became the dominant ethnic groups, and in 1909, the Spoetzl Brewery, the oldest independent brewery in Texas, was started. The brewery produces Shiner Bock, a dark German/Czech-style beer. After you finish the walk, you can purchase a tour of the brewery or some BBQ, listen to local bands, and visit the tasting room until 8pm.

Saturday November 8, the 11k/5k walk will start at 8am and finish by 12:30pm on the porch of the Gonzales Chamber of Commerce/Visitor Center. Walkers will proceed through historic Gonzales, passing museums and grand old homes. Gonzales is one of the earliest Anglo-American settlements in Texas, founded in 1825. It is referred to as "The Lexington of Texas" because it was the site of the first skirmish of the Texas Revolution in 1835, when more than 100 Mexican soldiers tried to retrieve a cannon they had loaned to the Gonzales citizens years before. A flag bearing the likeness of the cannon and the words "Come and Take It" was flown when the first shots of Texian independence were fired on October 2, 1835. The Texians won the "Battle of Gonzales". Later 32 men from Gonzales volunteered at the Alamo, the only city to send aid. All the men lost their lives defending the site.

Sunday's walk on November 9th is a 10K/5K at Palmetto State Park, about 15 miles from Gonzales, starting anytime from 8am – 10:30am. The walk is made of two 5K loops, one mainly on trails and among the Palmettos; the other on trails and roads through the park. The park was constructed by the Civilian Conservation Corps, and features bogs and dense vegetation, giving the park a jungle-like atmosphere. Water features include the San Marcos River along with the Oxbow Lake.

The host hotel for this 3-day event is the Sleep Inn and Suites by Choice Hotels in Gonzales. 25 rooms have been blocked at a special rate. Call 830-672-1888 and tell them you want the Texas Volkssport rate. Reservations must be made by two weeks before the event.

The Texas Volkssport Association (TVA) will hold a member meeting Saturday afternoon at the host hotel meeting room from 1:30pm – 5:00pm. All AVA walkers are invited to attend.

Fun Fact: the world's largest Buc-ee's Travel Center is 4 miles from Palmetto State Park in Luling Texas, on Interstate 10, featuring 120 fuel pumps, and 75,000 square feet of shopping. It's an experience you might want to visit on your way home Sunday.

NEW SEASONAL EVENT THROUGH HISTORIC PALESTINE, TX

A new seasonal walk begins October 1 through December 31, 2025 in Palestine, Texas, hosted by the East Texas Trekkers. Founded in the 1840's, Palestine was a major railroad center and includes many historic churches, buildings, homes and parks. A special group walk will take place Saturday November 1 at 9am in Palestine. Please contact Helen Hull if you would like to join the group: helenthehun@yahoo.com. Palestine is Helen's hometown where she was born, grew up, went to school, and still has friends and cousins. She promises to bore you with more information about the many sites in Palestine.

Palestine was also home to John H Reagan who was appointed a judge in the East Texas region in the 1840's. He established his practice there even after being warned that Palestine already had a number of lawyers in town. But even though his region included a little town a 100 miles to the north (Dallas), Palestine was the far more important city. Judge Reagan later served in many capacities including US Senator from Texas just before the Civil War. He resigned when Texas seceded from the Union and later served as Postmaster General of the Confederacy and was the only member of Jefferson Davis's cabinet captured with Davis after the war. After being released from prison, he returned to Palestine and later served as Texas Railroad Commission and was instrumental in persuading the Great Northern Pacific Railroad to make Palestine a regional center. The walk will go thru Reagan Park and pass Reagan School and the old Railroad Hospital.

More details to follow on the Texas Volkssport Facebook page. The walk is Online Start Box (OSB) only, but for the group walk, there will be a stamp available.

Located in the Piney Woods region of East Texas, Palestine is equidistant from Dallas, Houston, and Shreveport. It was founded by Daniel Parker who previously lived in Palestine, Illinois. The town is the home to the Texas State Railroad, which offers vintage train rides through the pine forests, and is a very popular excursion. There are over 1,800 historic sites and structures in the town, including many on the National Historic Registry of Homes. Palestine is also the official Dogwood Trails Capital of Texas, attracting thousands of visitors annually to the blooming of the Dogwood trees in the spring.
